Democrats Gain after 16 Years

Republicans Maintain a Legislative Majority, But Lose Super Status in the House

Democrats take the CFO position on the Florida Cabinet with Alex Sink's big win, and all proposed

constitutional amendments glide to easy wins, including the requirement that future constitutional amendments must pass by a 60 percent majority.

Florida Democrats will remain the minority party in both the Florida Senate and House of Representatives for at least the next two years; but for the first time in 16 years, Democrats picked up enough seats in the Florida House to break the strangle-hold Super Majority held by the Republicans.

A Super Majority is created when one party has enough members to win both a 3/5 and 2/3 vote. "Extraordinary votes" – as opposed to simple majority votes – are necessary to pass certain types of legislation

and to waive rules of procedure – a powerful leadership weapon. Democrats picked up seven seats yesterday thereby eliminating the 2/3 majority vote in the Florida House. Going into the General Election, Republicans held an 85-35 majority. After the General Election, the margin is 78-42.



Marco Rubio

Marco Rubio, a Cuban-American Representative from Miami-Dade County, remains poised to take the reigns of the House of Representatives as Speaker at the Organizational Session

set for November 21. The Speaker's term is two years. Future Speaker-Designees are Ray Sansom (R-Fort Walton) and Dean Cannon (R-Orlando). Thus, if the Republicans can maintain control of the House, leadership has been identified for the next six years.

Democrats picked up the following seats in the Florida House:

- H36 Orange: Incumbent Sheri McInvale lost to Scott Randolph
- H51 Pinellas: Janet Long wins an open Republican seat
- H52 Pinellas: Bill Heller wins an open Republican seat
- H69 Sarasota: Keith Fitzgerald wins an open Republican seat
- H97- Broward: Incumbent Susan Goldstein lost to Martin Kiar
- H107 Miami-Dade: Luis Garcia wins an open Republican seat
- H120 Monroe/Miami-Dade: Ron Saunders wins an open Republican seat

In the Florida Senate, Republicans maintained their 26-14 majority; however, two seats flipped party control. Democrat Charlie Justice defeated Republican Kim Berfield in Senate

District 16, once held by Republican Senator Jim Sebesta; Republican Sheriff Steve Oelrich defeated Democrat Ed Jennings in Senate District 14, once held by Democratic Senator Rod Smith. The current Senate President-Designee is Ken Pruitt (R-Port St. Lucie), who also will be sworn into office on November 21.



Alex Sink

The big news on the Florida Cabinet is political newcomer and former Nations Bank CEO Alex Sink, who easily defeated Senate President Tom Lee to become the first

Democrat on the four-member Cabinet since 1998, when Bill Nelson won the State Treasurer position. Sink is highly regarded as an intellectual and conservative on business issues, which made her appealing to the state business community, particularly the banking and insurance sectors.

Republican Attorney General Charlie Crist won a solid victory in the Governor's race over Democratic Congressman Jim Davis; former Republican Congressman Bill McCollum beat state Democratic Senator Skip Campbell; and incumbent Republican Agricultural Commissioner Charlie Bronson easily beat Democrat Eric Copeland.

Perhaps the most notable election impact in relation to the Cabinet will be at the appointment level. Sitting as the Financial Services Commission, the Cabinet appoints the Commissioner of Insurance (now held by Kevin McCarty). Current law does not give any Cabinet officer direct authority over the position. Rather, appointment or removal requires the Governor and CFO to be voting on the same side. This is also true of the Commissioner of Financial Regulation (now held by Don Saxon).

2006 ELECTION RESULTS CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

Amendment #1: Approved

State Planning and Budget Process

Effective Date: Task Force must be appointed no later than January 2007. Establishes a long-range budget-planning process and creates a Government Efficiency Task Force to seek input from the public, executive and judicial branches and create a long-range financial plan.

YES for Approval: 59.8% NO for Rejection: 40.2%

Amendment #3: Approved

Requiring Broader Public Support for Constitutional Amendments or Revisions

Effective Date: January 2, 2007 Increases the number of votes needed to approve ballot initiatives from 50% +1 to 60% of those voting on the measure.

YES for Approval: 57.7% NO for Rejection: 42.3%

Amendment #4: Approved

Protect People, Especially Youth from Addiction, Disease, and Other Health Hazards of Using Tobacco

Effective Date: Immediately

Requires 15% (\$57 million) of the 2005 tobacco settlement payments to Florida will fund a statewide tobacco education and prevention program.

VEC for Approval, 60.09

YES for Approval: 60.9% NO for Rejection: 39.1%

Amendment #6: Approved

Increased Homestead Exemption

Effective Date: January 1, 2007

Authorizes the Legislature to allow counties

to increase the maximum additional

homestead exemption for low-income seniors* from \$25,000 to \$50,000. * Low-income seniors: 65 years old or above with a household income that does not exceed \$20,000.

YES for Approval: 76% NO for Rejection: 24%

Amendment #7: Approved

Permanently Disabled Veterans' Discount on Homestead Ad Valorem Tax

Effective Date: December 7, 2006 Lowers taxes for disabled veterans by allowing them to take a discount on their homestead property tax equal in proportion to the amount of disability as determined by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs.

YES for Approval: 77.8% NO for Rejection: 22.2%

Amendment #8: Approved

Eminent Domain

Effective Date: January 2, 2007
Requires private property taken by eminent domain must be retained for 10 years before it may be transferred to another private entity.

YES for Approval: 69% NO for Rejection: 31%
