

November 7 is Election Day

Most Notable Primary Election Outcomes are in the Florida Senate

ncumbent Senator Alex Villalobos wins his primary regardless of a massive effort to unseat him – his



return means a continuation of the fight for the Senate Presidency.

This Capitol Report contains a list of all state candidates advancing to the November 2006 General Election as a result of yesterday's Primary Elections. Candidates with a "(W)" or "(N)" affiliation attached to their name represent, for the most part, minor opposition at the General Election. In these races it is safe to assume that the major party candidate wins. Candidates showing no opposition are elected.

Battleground state legislative races to watch in the Florida Senate will be districts 14 (Gainesville and surrounding area) and 16 (Tampa Bay area). The outcome of these races could very well change the power base in the Florida Senate. Returning Senator Alex Villalobos (R-Miami) – having won yesterday's Primary – is now hoping to corral all of the Senate Democrats and some Republicans to take back his lost bid for the 2009-10 Senate Presidency from Senator Jeff Atwater (R-West Palm Beach). The ongoing riff has caused a severe split within the Senate Republican Caucus and now threatens the work of the Senate in the near future. The current Senate President-Designee is Ken Pruitt (R-Port St. Lucie).

We do not expect the power-base to shift in the House of Representatives, but watch districts 11 (Gainesville), 22 (Ocala), and 51 (St. Petersburg). The current Speaker-Designee is Marco Rubio (R-Miami).

"In the state Senate, Villalobos also had few close friends. And those he thought were his allies, such as Lake Wales' Sen. J.D. Alexander and North Palm Beach's Jeff Atwater, helped oust him as Senate president for the two-year term beginning in 2008. Taking Villalobos' post was Atwater, who once wore a gold cross Villalobos brought to the pope for a blessing."

"Villalobos insists that he can still be Senate president. If so, he'll need the support of all 14 Democrats -- a likely possibility -- plus six Republican senators in the 40-member chamber. One of those senators, Nancy Argenziano of Crystal River, suggested Bush was a "dictator" for his involvement in the race.
